## **HOLIDAY REFLECTIONS: A SEASON OF LIGHT, GRATITUDE, AND NEMBUTSU**

*Although I too am within Amida's embracing light,  
blind passions obstruct my eyes, and I cannot see it.  
Yet great compassion, without tiring,  
illuminates me always.  
— Shinran Shōnin*

**T**he holiday season has always held a special place in my heart. Across the world, this is a time when many different religions and cultures celebrate—from Christmas to Hanukkah, from Bodhi Day to New Year traditions and countless others. Although the customs vary, there is a shared feeling that runs through them all: the renewal of hope and a desire for peace, connection and goodwill. To me, this spirit resonates deeply with our Jōdo Shinshū teachings.

What strikes me each year is how people of every background seem to soften during this season. We become a little more patient, a little more generous, a little more open to one another. Whether it's hearing Christmas carols, lighting candles or gathering with loved ones, these traditions point toward something universal—the human longing to feel connected and embraced. Shinran reminds us that even when we cannot see it clearly, we are always held in Amida's boundless compassion. The holidays, in their many forms, help us catch glimpses of that light.

Just as holidays bring us together, my own family has been a source of light this year. The support and love from Carmela and our family continue to guide me. The new grandkids, Arrow and Rumi, have brought fresh joy into our lives. We get to visit their family with Bala and Katie almost twice weekly. Kacie is finished with school and beginning work. Taylor and Olu seem to be well, living and working in the heart of L.A. I am deeply grateful to each of you—our sangha, friends, and extended community. Your kindness, participation and patience throughout the year have made all our temples and programs possible. You have shown me, again and again, how community can be the true light in uncertain times.

In Jōdo Shinshū, gratitude naturally arises from awakening to the compassion that surrounds us. Shinran wrote that those who realize shinjin are “filled with great joy,” not a joy of perfection, but a joy rooted in being accepted just as we are. During this season, that joy feels especially present. The warmth we feel is not separate from the Dharma—it is another way Amida's compassionate activity appears in our daily lives.

As the year comes to a close, this season invites us to pause and reflect on the gifts that truly matter. Not the material ones, but the gifts of one another, of shared traditions, of compassion and of the Nembutsu. The Nembutsu, Amida's call to us, reminds us that we are never alone—whether we celebrate with family or quietly on our own. It connects us to all beings across cultures, beliefs, and borders.

As we enter the new year, my hope is that the light of wisdom continues to guide you, the warmth of compassion comforts you, and the Nembutsu sustains you through every season of life.

Thank you for your presence, your support and your friendship. May the coming year be one of peace, gratitude and gentle joy.

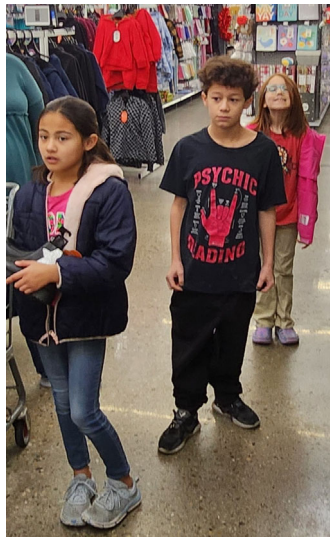
## DHARMA SCHOOL NEWS

## **54<sup>th</sup> MOUNTAIN STATES DISTRICT CONFERENCE**

The Buddhist Church of Ogden was the host of this year's Mountain States Conference, held in Moab, Utah, November 7-9 with 92 attendees from the Salt Lake, Tri-State/Denver, Longmont and Ogden temples.

Our guest speaker was Rev. Kiyonobu Kuwahara, the Supervising Minister of the Buddhist Temple of the Marin and Berkeley Buddhist Temple. Rev. Kuwahara gave a Dharma message at the Saturday night service, focused on the conference's theme of "Where is the Pure Land?"

Two activities were held Saturday. Several participants were treated to a beautiful car-tour of Canyonlands National Park led by Kirk Y., while the rest were given a personal tour of the cultural and historical exhibits in the visitor's center at the Utahrapator State Park by Justina P.-B., the Heritage Interpretation and ADA Resources Manager. The park is home of two historic camps that were located there: the Dalton-Wells Civilian Conservation Corps Camp and the Moab Citizen Isolation Center for Japanese American internees during World War II. It was an educational and enlightening experience.

Everyone was supplied with a sack lunch that included beautiful cookies hand-made by KayLe Y.



After service and a wonderful dinner planned by Suzan Y., some of the attendees drove to Balanced Rock for some Dark Sky gazing. Ernie and Andrew K. thoughtfully brought their telescopes along, and we were treated to close-up views of the moon and Saturn and its rings. Others stayed at the hotel and played card games, with Steve K. manning the bar.

The closing service was held at Balanced Rock inside Arches National Park. Although it was held outside where he could not access a computer or PowerPoint, Rev. Kuwahara still managed to give a visual presentation. He first presented the word "Think" with the I capitalized, which represented thinking in a self-centered way. His second word was "Insist," with two capital I letters, which represented people who insist on following their own way of thinking, and then the word "Criticize," with the I capitalized three times, indicating criticizing others instead of being more empathetic. Finally, he showed the name "Amida," which encompasses everyone and is not focused on individuals. It was a perfect talk to end a great weekend, and Geoff R., Annette K., Kris Y. and all of the organizing committee deserve great thanks.





## 2026 OGDEN DHARMA SCHOOL WINTER PARTY January 18, 2026 **ICE FISHING at MANTUA RESERVOIR**

### **WHEN**

1. On the ice at 7:30am. If you want to carpool, meet at the church by 7:00am.
2. We'll fish until about 1:00pm and plan on lunch at 2:00pm.
3. If you can't make it fishing, please feel free to come to the church for lunch!

### **HOW TO GET THERE**

1. Travel up I-15 North to exit 362 (the first Brigham City exit).
2. Exit freeway at exit 362. There are several freeway signs designating this exit ("US 89/91 North", "Logan/Utah State" "1100 South").
3. Travel through the two signal lights and continue on US 89/91.
4. Go past the first Mantua exit.
5. Exit to the right at the second Mantua exit.
6. Turn right at stop sign on MAIN STREET and travel south about a quarter mile.
7. Parking lots will be on your left. There are two lots – a small one near the restrooms (a building with a red roof) and a larger lot slightly before that.
8. Walk up the dike to access the reservoir. Look for the red fishing tent with the red University of Utah banner.

### **WHAT TO BRING**

1. A fishing license\* – If you are 12 years old or older you need a license to fish. Buy your license at any license agent (e.g.: Sportsman's Warehouse, etc.) or on-line at <http://wildlife.utah.gov>.
2. Warm clothes (dress in layers) – gloves, hat, snow pants and especially insulated (preferably waterproof) boots.
3. Optional –
  - a. Something to sit on – small, collapsible camp chairs work well.
  - b. Drinks and snacks.
  - c. A change of clothes (just in case).

### **WHAT TO BE CAREFUL OF**

1. Be very careful when walking on the ice - it can be very slippery. Also be aware of drilled ice holes – they can be as large as 10 inches in diameter, and you don't want to step in them.
2. Don't worry if you hear the ice crack...that means the ice is safe (really!)
3. **Carefully observe all traffic laws in and around Mantua – the local police can be overzealous, and you don't want to get a ticket!**


